In a related action Wednesday, COTA trustees voted to spend \$50,000 for a six-month option to buy 63.7 acres in northeastern Columbus that COTA may never use.

The land, all railroad right of ville. way and owned by Conrail, was being prepared for sale before the Central Ohio Transit Authority stepped in.

"If they start tearing up the track and selling the land to people to build over the right of way, it's gone for us and we can

never get it back," said Assistant General Manager Tom Jones. "This way, at least they've agreed to stop for now."

Jones said the land parallels Conrail tracks between 17th and Cleveland Aves. east of I-71 and extends northeast to Wester-

Jones said the right of way could be developed using the existing rails or COTA could develop it as an exclusive bus way.

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
