## Saturday, September 3, 1988

A daily record precipitation of 1.80" fell at Port Columbus. This broke the old record of 1.49" set in 1909.

A NEW RECORD LOW TEMPERATURE SET AT PORT COLUMBUS INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT FOR THIS DATE. AT 230 AM EDT THE TEMPERATURE DIPPED TO 43 DEGREES SURPASSING THE PREVIOUS RECORD LOW OF 44 DEGREES SET IN 1962. THE TEMPERAURE CONTINUED TO DROP THROUGH THE EARLY MORNING HOURS AND AT 630 AM EDT REACHED 40 DEGREES FOR THE NEW RECORD LOW FOR THIS DATE.

## Wednesday, October 12, 1988

A daily record snowfall of a Trace fell at Port Columbus. This ties the previous record for the date set in 1907, 1909, 1917 and 1921.

AT 220 AM EDT THE TEMPERATURE DROPPED TO 28 DEGREES BREAKING THE PREVIOUS RECORD LOW OF 29 DEGREES SET IN 1909. THIS HAS BEEN THE COLDEST TEMPERATURE SO FAR SINCE THE SPRING. THE LAST TIME IT WAS THIS COLD WAS APRIL 20 WHEN THE TEMPERATURE DROPPED TO 27 DEGREES FOR THE MORNING LOW.

THESE THUNDERSTORMS MAY CAUSE BRIEF PERIODS OF HEAVY RAIN... DANGEROUS LIGHTNING... SMALL HAIL... AND STRONG GUSTY WINDS. THERE HAVE BEEN REPORTS OF SOME URBAN AND STREET FLOODING FROM THESES STORMS.
