SPECIAL WEATHER STATEMENT

NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE COLUMBUS OH

707 AM EDT SAT OCT 7 1989

AREAS OF DENSE FOG WERE REDUCING VISIBILITY TO NEAR ZERO IN MANY LOCATIONS OF CENTRAL OHIO THIS MORNING.

AT 7AM THE VISIBILITY AT PORT COLUMBUS AIRPORT WAS ONE-EIGHTH (1/8) OF A MILE. OTHER REPORTING STATIONS IN THE COLUMBUS AREA WERE ALSO SHOWING VISIBILITIES WELL UNDER ONE MILE. THE FOG WILL REMAIN DENSE THROUGH EARLY THIS MORNING AND EXTRA TIME SHOULD BE ALLOWED FOR TRAVEL. THE FOG WILL GRADUALLY LIFT AND NO TRAVEL PROBLEMS ARE LIKELY AFTER ABOUT 9AM EDT.

RAIN WAS CHANGING TO SNOW ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO EARLY THIS MORNING.

THE RAIN CHANGED TO SNOW FROM WEST TO EAST ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO THIS MORNING AND CALLS TO LOCAL COUNTY SHERIFFS OFFICES REVEALED THAT THE SNOW WAS ACCUMULATING ON GRASSY AREAS. IN FACT... PICKAWAY COUNTY RECEIVED REPORTS OF A QUARTER TO A HALF INCH OF SNOW ACCUMULATING ON ROADWAYS. ROSS AND HOCKING COUNTY REPORTED SLUSHY ROADS AND WHITENED OVERPASSES. MARION COUNTY REPORTED A MIX OF RAIN AND SLEET... AND FREEZING RAIN WAS FALLING AROUND PLAIN CITY IN THE SOUTHEAST PART OF UNION COUNTY.

SNOW WILL CONTINUE TO FALL OVER CENTRAL OHIO THIS MORNING WITH ACCUMULATIONS LIKELY BEFORE NOON.

A daily snowfall record was set at Port Columbus. 0.4" fell, breaking the old record of a Trace tied in 1917, 1925, 1972 and 1974.
