AT 1045 AM LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS IN THE WARNED COUNTIES INDICATE THAT MANY STREAMS AND CREEKS WERE FLOODING AND WATER WAS COVERING SEVERAL ROADS IN THE COUNTIES.

AT 1045 AM NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR INDICATED A LARGE AREA OF RAIN...SOME MODERATE TO HEAVY...ACROSS MOST OF CENTRAL OHIO. RAIN IS EXPECTED TO CONTINUE ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO THROUGH THE AFTERNOON AND SINCE IT IS FALLING ON SATURATED GROUND IT WILL CAUSE WATER LEVELS TO CONTINUE TO RISE. RAIN CONTINUED OVER THESE COUNTIES AND WILL COMBINE WITH RUNOFF FROM THE EARLIER RAINFALL TO SEND STREAMS OUT OF THEIR BANKS OVER THE WARNED COUNTIES. LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS REPORT NUMEROUS CREEKS AND STREAMS ALREADY IN FLOOD OVER THE WARNED COUNTIES WITH SOME ROAD CLOSURES.

A WINTER WEATHER ADVISORY IS IN EFFECT FOR SOUTHERN OHIO TONIGHT... INCLUDING ATHENS AND VINTON COUNTIES.

AT 350 PM RADAR INDICATED AN AREA OF RAIN...SLEET AND SNOW ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO. THE SLEET AND SNOW WAS MAINLY CONFINED TO UNION... MARION...AND NORTHERN DELAWARE COUNTIES. THE PRECIPITATION WAS MOVING NORTHWEST AT 15 MILES AN HOUR.

WHERE THE SNOW AND SLEET MIX WAS FALLING IT WAS MELTING ON ROADWAYS. AS THE RAIN CHANGES TO SNOW AND SLEET ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO THIS EVENING ANY ACCUMULATION WILL INITIALLY BE CONFINED TO GRASSY AREAS AS THE TEMPERATURE WILL STAY ABOVE FREEZING.

HOWEVER...THE TEMPERATURE WILL FALL TO NEAR FREEZING LATER TONIGHT AND ROAD CONDITIONS WILL LIKELY DETERIORATE. GENERALLY...2 TO 4 INCHES OF SNOW IS EXPECTED TO ACCUMULATE BY FRIDAY MORNING OVER CENTRAL OHIO... WITH ADDITIONAL ACCUMULATION POSSIBLE DURING THE DAY FRIDAY.

RAINFALL AMOUNTS UP TO 1 INCH THURSDAY ON ALREADY SATURATED GROUND CAUSED SOME ROADS TO BECOME FLOODED AND STREAMS TO RISE TO NEAR BANKFULL ACROSS PARTS OF CENTRAL OHIO. SHERIFF DEPARTMENT OFFICIALS ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO REPORTED SOME ROAD CLOSURES DUE TO FLOODING. RAIN CHANGED TO WET SNOW ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO THURSDAY EVENING...AND THE WET SNOW WILL CONTINUE INTO EARLY THIS AFTERNOON. THE WATER ADDED FROM THIS WET SNOW WILL BE LESS THAN ONE QUARTER OF AN INCH...AND THIS WILL ALLOW THE WATER TO GRADUALLY RECEDE TODAY.

SNOW IS EXPECTED TO CONTINUE TO DEVELOP ACROSS ALL OF CENTRAL OHIO THIS MORNING WITH DETERIORATING ROAD CONDITIONS. AS OF 5 AM...AN INCH OF SNOW HAD ALREADY FALLEN IN ATHENS AND ROADS WERE BECOMING SNOW COVERED ACROSS SOUTH CENTRAL AND SOUTHEAST OHIO. 3 TO 5 INCHES OF SNOW IS EXPECTED ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO BY EVENING...WITH ADDITIONAL ACCUMULATION LIKELY TONIGHT.

SNOW WILL CONTINUE ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO UNTIL AFTER MIDNIGHT...THEN SHOULD TAPER TO SNOW FLURRIES. NEAR COLUMBUS...SNOW COULD ACCUMULATE ANOTHER INCH. IN THE COUNTIES SOUTH AND SOUTHEAST OF COLUMBUS...FROM 1 TO 3 INCHES OF ADDITIONAL SNOWFALL IS POSSIBLE OVERNIGHT.

ALL OF THE PRECIPITATION WAS MOVING NORTHEAST AROUND 25 MILES AN HOUR. RAIN AND ISOLATED THUNDERSTORMS WILL CONTINUE OVER ALL OF CENTRAL OHIO THIS EVENING BUT WILL BE GRADUALLY DIMINISHING. MOST OF THE RAIN SHOULD BE ENDED BY AROUND MIDNIGHT.

THE RAINFALL AT THE COLUMBUS WEATHER OFFICE SINCE EARLY THIS MORNING UNTIL 6 PM HAS BEEN OVER AN INCH (1.30). AT 115 AM NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR INDICATED A LARGE AREA OF RAIN COVERING CENTRAL OHIO. A FEW POCKETS OF MODERATE RAIN WERE INDICATED IN NORTHERN AND EASTERN LICKING COUNTY AND IN WESTERN MUSKINGUM COUNTY. THE RAIN AREA WAS MOVING NORTHEAST AT 20 MILES AN HOUR...AND LIGHT RAIN WILL CONTINUE ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO UNTIL DAYBREAK.

STREAMS AND CREEKS WERE NEAR BANKFULL...AND SOME ROADS WERE NEARLY IMPASSIBLE WITH HIGH WATER. IN COLUMBUS...AN AREA OF HIGH WATER WAS ON STELTZER ROAD BETWEEN ROSS LABORATORIES AND MORSE ROAD. THE BIG WALNUT CREEK WAS ABOUT 1 FOOT BELOW FLOOD BANKFULL.

THE LICKING COUNTY SHERIFF OFFICE REPORTED HIGH WATER ON SOME ROADS IN THE NORTHERN PART OF THEIR COUNTY. STREAMS AND CREEKS WERE REPORTED NEAR BANKFULL IN MADISON COUNTY BY THE MADISON COUNTY SHERIFF OFFICE. SOME MINOR FLOODING HAS OCCURRED IN LOW-LYING AREAS IN CENTRAL OHIO. RAINFALL AMOUNTS OF 11/2 TO 13/4 INCHES HAVE OCCURRED SINCE SUNDAY MORNING OVER PARTS OF CENTRAL OHIO...WITH 1.68 INCHES RECORDED FROM THE COLUMBUS NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE OFFICE.

THE ADDITIONAL LIGHT RAIN OVERNIGHT WILL BRING LESS THAN ONE QUARTER OF AN INCH TO CENTRAL OHIO...AND THIS SHOULD ALLOW THE WATER TO STAY WITHIN THE BANKS OF MOST STREAMS AND CREEKS. HOWEVER...SOME MINOR FLOODING COULD OCCUR WITH SOME STREAMS.

AT 625 AM NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR INDICATED AN AREA OF RAIN COVERNING THE SOUTHEAST HALF OF OHIO...SOUTHEAST OF A MOUNT VERNON TO COLUMBUS TO WASHINGTON COURTHOUSE LINE. A POCKET OF MODERATE RAIN WAS

FALLING BETWEEN LANCASTER...NEWARK...AND ZANESVILLE. THE RAIN AREA WAS MOVING SLOWLY EAST AT 20 MILES AN HOUR...AND RAIN WILL GRADUALLY END IN THE COUNTIES EAST THROUGH SOUTH OF COLUMBUS DURING THE MORNING. STREAMS AND CREEKS WERE NEAR BANKFULL...AND SOME ROADS HAD HIGH WATER. SINCE THE GROUND IS ALREADY SATURATED FROM HEAVY RAINFALL OF 1 TO 13/4 INCHES YESTERDAY...THE ADDITIONAL RAIN THIS MORNING COULD CAUSE MINOR FLOODING WITH SOME STREAMS.
