NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE COLUMBUS OH

820 PM EST SAT NOV 6 1993

LIGHT SNOW IS FALLING OVER MOST OF CENTRAL AND SOUTH CENTRAL OHIO TONIGHT.

AT 815 PM EST NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR IN COLUMBUS INDICATED A LARGE AREA OF LIGHT SNOW BOUNDED BY A LINE EXTENDING FROM DAYTON...TO MANSFIELD...TO ATHENS...AND BACK TO DAYTON.

THE SNOW WAS MOVING TO THE EAST AT 15 MILES AN HOUR.

LITTLE TO NO ACCUMULATION OF SNOW IS EXPECTED IN CENTRAL AND SOUTH CENTRAL OHIO TONIGHT...BUT AS SURFACE TEMPERATURES FALL TOWARDS THE FREEZING MARK ROADS MAY BECOME HAZARDOUS. ROADS IN CENTRAL OHIO HAVE BECOME WET...THE DELAWARE COUNTY SHERIFFS OFFICE REPORTED SLIPPERY ROADS IN THAT COUNTY...AND DRIVERS SHOULD USE CAUTION WHILE TRAVELING.

628 AM EST SAT NOV 13 1993

MODERATE TO HEAVY RAINSHOWERS WERE OCCURRING OVER MUCH OF CENTRAL OHIO EARLY THIS MORNING.

AT 625 AM NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR INDICATED A LARGE AREA OF RAINSHOWERS COVERING ALL OF CENTRAL OHIO. THE RAIN WAS MODERATE TO HEAVY AT TIMES.

NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE DOPPLER RADAR FROM CLEVELAND INDICATED AN ESTIMATED RAINFALL TOTAL OF UP TO 1.2 INCHES IN PARTS OF DELAWARE AND UNION COUNTIES SINCE 315 AM.

SHOWERS WILL CONTINUE ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO EARLY THIS MORNING...WITH MODERATE TO HEAVY RAIN AT TIMES THROUGH 800 AM.

MODERATE TO HEAVY RAINSHOWERS WERE FALLING IN CENTRAL OHIO THIS MORNING.

AT 825 AM EST NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR IN COLUMBUS INDICATED RAINSHOWERS OVER MUCH OF THE SOUTHERN TWO-THIRDS OF OHIO. THE HEAVIEST RAINSHOWERS WERE OVER FRANKLIN...NORTHERN PICKAWAY...SOUTHERN DELAWARE...WESTERN LICKING...AND NORTHERN FAIRFIELD COUNTIES.

ISOLATED THUNDERSTORMS WERE ALSO NOTED IN NORTHWESTERN FAIRFIELD COUNTY...JUST WEST OF BALTIMORE. THESE SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS WERE MOVING TO THE NORTHEAST AT 40 MILES AN HOUR.

RESIDENTS IN AND AROUND THE COMMUNITIES OF DELAWARE...MT VERNON...

NEWARK...LANCASTER...AND THE COLUMBUS METROPOLITAN AREA CAN EXPECT

PERIODS OF HEAVY RAINSHOWERS AND OCCASIONAL THUNDERSTORMS THROUGH 930 AM EST.

1127 AM EST SAT NOV 13 1993

HEAVY RAINSHOWERS HAVE CONTINUED OVER PORTIONS OF EAST CENTRAL OHIO THIS MORNING.

AT 1125 AM EST NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR IN COLUMBUS INDICATED A LARGE AREA OF RAIN AND RAINSHOWERS OVER MUCH OF THE SOUTHEASTERN HALF OF OHIO. THIS AREA IS PRIMARILY SOUTH AND EAST OF A LINE FROM NEAR DAYTON... TO MOUNT GILEAD...TO AKRON.

THE PRECIPITATION IS MOVING TO THE NORTHEAST AT 40 MILES AND HOUR. RAINFALL TOTALS THROUGHOUT CENTRAL OHIO HAVE BEEN AROUND 1 TO 1 1/2 INCHES SINCE MIDNIGHT. THE NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE DOPPLER RADAR IN CLEVELAND INDICATED AN ESTIMATED AMOUNT IN EXCESS OF 2 INCHES IN PORTIONS OF LICKING COUNTY.

ALTHOUGH THE RAIN HAS STARTED TO TAPER OFF IN THE SOUTHWESTERN AND WEST CENTRAL PART OF OHIO...EAST CENTRAL OHIO MAY CONTINUE TO RECEIVE PERIODS OF HEAVY RAIN THROUGH 1230 PM EST. THIS INCLUDES RESIDENTS IN THE COUNTIES OF LICKING...KNOX..AND MUSKINGUM.

A record 1.33" of rainfall fell during the day, surpassing the old record of 0.87" set in 1929.

FLOOD WARNING EFFECTIVE UNTIL 330 PM EST

FOR PEOPLE IN THE FOLLOWING COUNTIES...IN CENTRAL OHIO

...MARION COUNTY...UNION COUNTY

URBAN AND SMALL STREAM FLOODING IS LIKELY THIS MORNING AND AFTERNOON THROUGHOUT PORTIONS OF WESTERN AND NORTH CENTRAL OHIO.

HEAVY RAIN HAVE BEEN FALLING OVER MUCH OF THE WESTERN THIRD AND NORTHERN THIRD OF OHIO SINCE 5 AM EST. THE NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE DOPPLER RADAR IN CLEVELAND INDICATED ESTIMATED RAINFALL AMOUNTS OF 1 TO 2 INCHES IN MARION COUNTY BETWEEN 5 AM AND 8 AM EST. A VOLUNTEER OBSERVER IN GREEN CAMP...IN SOUTHWEST MARION COUNTY...REPORTED 2 INCHES OF ADDITIONAL RAINFALL SINCE MIDNIGHT.

THE RUNOFF FROM ADDITIONAL RAIN WILL LIKELY TRIGGER FLOODING IN SOME URBAN AREAS AND ALONG SMALL STREAMS. PEOPLE LIVING NEAR SMALL STREAMS SHOULD LISTEN FOR THE LATEST WEATHER INFORMATION AND BE PREPARED TO MOVE TO SAFETY IF FLOODING IS OBSERVED.

A FLOOD WATCH IS IN EFFECT FOR THE CENTRAL OHIO COUNTIES OF CHAMPAIGN...CLARK...DELAWARE...GREENE...FAYETTE...LOGAN...AND MADISON. MANY COUNTIES IN CENTRAL OHIO RECEIVED BETWEEN 1 TO 2 INCHES OF RAIN YESTERDAY. A VOLUNTEER OBSERVER IN GREEN CAMP...IN SOUTHWEST MARION COUNTY...REPORTED A TOTAL RAINFALL OF 2.7 INCHES SINCE MIDNIGHT. THE AMOUNT OF NEW RAIN THIS MORNING...COMBINED WITH ADDITIONAL RAIN THIS AFTERNOON...IS LIKELY TO TRIGGER FLOODING OF URBAN AREAS AND SMALL STREAMS.

THE SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS ARE ASSOCIATED WITH A SLOW MOVING COLD FRONT OVER NORTHWEST OHIO. WHILE THE FRONT REMAINS NORTHWEST OF CENTRAL OHIO...SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS WILL CONTINUE OVER MUCH OF THE CENTRAL PART OF THE STATE.

AT 135 PM EST NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR IN COLUMBUS INDICATED RAINSHOWERS AND ISOLATED THUNDERSTORMS OVER MUCH OF THE WESTERN HALF OF OHIO. MOVEMENT WAS TOWARDS THE NORTHEAST AT 30 MILES AN HOUR. THE HEAVIEST SHOWERS IN CENTRAL OHIO WERE LOCATED IN FAYETTE...ROSS...PICKAWAY...AND FAIRFIELD COUNTIES. RESIDENTS IN AND AROUND THE COMMUNITIES OF WASHINGTON COURT HOUSE...CHILLICOTHE...CIRCLEVILLE...AND LANCASTER CAN EXPECT PERIODS OF HEAVY RAIN THROUGH 230 PM EST.

ALTHOUGH THE RAIN HAD TAPERED OFF IN MARION...UNION...AND DELAWARE COUNTIES...MORE RAIN CAN BE EXPECTED THROUGHOUT THE AFTERNOON. NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR IN CINCINNATI INDICATED THAT HEAVY RAIN EXTENDED FROM SOUTHWEST OHIO TO SOUTHERN INDIANA AND NORTH CENTRAL KENTUCKY.

THE URBAN AND SMALL STREAM FLOOD WARNING FOR MARION AND UNION COUNTIES HAS EXPIRED.

AT 330 PM EST NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR INDICATED A LARGE AREA OF

SHOWERS AND EMBEDDED THUNDERSTORMS OVER MOST OF OHIO. THE HEAVIEST RAINS WERE IN EXTREME SOUTHEAST OHIO. THE SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS WERE MOVING TOWARDS THE NORTHEAST AT 30 MILES AN HOUR. HEAVIER SHOWERS ALSO EXTEND SOUTHWEST INTO INDIANA AND WESTERN KETUCKY AND WILL MOVE INTO CENTRAL OHIO LATER THIS AFTERNOON AND EVENING. THE AMOUNT OF RAIN THAT HAS FALLEN SINCE FRIDAY...COMBINED WITH NEW RAINFALL TONIGHT...COULD POSE FLOODING PROBLEMS FOR CENTRAL OHIO.

THE HEAVIEST RAIN IN CENTRAL OHIO WAS IN SOUTHERN PICKAWAY AND NORTHERN ROSS COUNTIES. THE AREA OF RAIN WAS MOVING NORTHEAST AROUND 30 MILES AN HOUR. RAIN AND SCATTERED THUDERSTORMS WERE ALSO OVER SOUTHERN INDIANA AND NORTHERN KENTUCKY. THESE AREAS OF RAIN WILL BE MOVING NORTHEAST INTO OHIO LATER TONIGHT. RAINFALL DURING THE DAY TODAY HAS BEEN OVER AN INCH IN SOME AREAS OF CENTRAL OHIO. THE NEW RAIN WILL BE FALLING ON GROUND ALREADY SATURATED FROM THE PREVIOUS RAINFALL SINCE FRIDAY AND SOME SMALL STREAMS ARE LIKELY TO RISE OUT OF THEIR BANKS. THE AREA OF RAIN WAS MOVING NORTHEAST AROUND 30 MILES AN HOUR. MORE RAIN WAS TO THE SOUTHWEST OF OHIO THAT WILL BE MOVING INTO OHIO OVERNIGHT.

THE HEAVIEST RAINFALL THIS EVENING WAS OVER HOCKING AND VINTON COUNTIES. NO FLOODING PROBLEMS HAVE BEEN REPORTED AS OF 735 PM IN CENTRAL OHIO. RAINFALL OVER CENTRAL OHIO IN THE PAST 24 HOURS HAS RANGED FROM AROUND A HALF INCH TO OVER 2 INCHES. THE ADDITIONAL RAINFALL OVERNIGHT WILL BE FALLING ON GROUND THAT IS SATURATED. THIS COULD CAUSE SOME PONDING OF WATER IN LOW LYING AREAS AND ON ROADWAYS. SOME SMALL STREAM FLOODING IS ALSO POSSIBLE.

RAIN IS EXPECTED TO SPREAD INTO OHIO FROM THE SOUTH AFTER MIDNIGHT AND REACH CENTRAL OHIO LATE TONIGHT. RAINFALL AMOUNTS OF AROUND 1 INCH ARE LIKELY FROM COLUMBUS NORTHWARD.
