AT 7 PM NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR INDICATED A MIXTURE OF LIGHT RAIN...SLEET...AND SNOW ACROSS MUCH OF CENTRAL OHIO. THE PRECIPITATION WAS MOVING SOUTHEAST AT 30 MILES AN HOUR.

THIS PRECIPITATION WAS ASSOCIATED WITH A COLD FRONT MOVING THROUGH THE AREA. MOST OF THE SLEET AND SNOW WAS FALLING OVER THE AREA EAST OF COLUMBUS JUST ALONG THE FRONT. LICKING...FAIRFIELD AND NORTHERN PICKAWAY COUNTIES WERE REPORTING SOME LIGHT SLEET AND SNOW AT 645 PM. AS THE FRONT MOVES THROUGH THE AREA EAST AND SOUTHEAST OF COLUMBUS A BRIEF PERIOD OF SLEET AND SNOW IS POSSIBLE. THE PRECIPITATION SHOULD THEN CHANGE BACK TO LIGHT RAIN. DUE TO THE WARM GROUND...STREETS SHOULD REMAIN MAINLY WET. NO ROAD PROBLEMS HAVET BEEN REPORTED FROM THE SLEET OR SNOW.

WINDS COULD ALSO BRIEFLY GUST TO 30 MILES AN HOUR AS THE FRONT MOVES THROUGH AND TEMPERATURES WILL FALL FROM THE MID 40S TO THE MID TO UPPER 30S AFTER FRONTAL PASSAGE.

A daily record snowfall occurred at Port Columbus for the date. The Trace of snow tied the record set in 1966 and 1972.
