A STRONG THUNDERSTORM WAS IN EASTERN DELAWARE AND NORTHWESTERN LICKING COUNTY THIS AFTERNOON.

AT 230 PM NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR INDICATED A STRONG THUNDERSTORM

IN EASTERN DELAWARE COUNTY...NEAR THE TOWNS OF SUNBURY...CONDIT...AND SOUTH CONDIT. THIS STORM EXTENDED INTO NORTHWEST LICKING COUNTY. THIS STORM WAS MOVING NORTH-NORTHEAST AT 30 MILES AN HOUR...INTO NORTHEAST DELAWARE COUNTY.

THIS STORM WILL PRODUCE BRIEF VERY HEAVY RAIN...FREQUENT LIGHTNING...GUSTY WINDS TO 45 MILES AN HOUR...AND POSSIBLY SMALL HAIL.

AT 315 PM NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR INDICATED SCATTERED SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS DEVELOPING IN SOUTHERN PERRY...HOCKING...AND NORTHERN VINTON COUNTIES. THE STRONGEST STORM WAS ABOUT 10 MILES SOUTH OF LOGAN IN HOCKING COUNTY. THE SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS WERE MOVING NORTH-NORTHEAST AT 335 MILES AN HOUR...AND WILL MOVE ACROSS PERRY COUNTY THROUGH 4 PM.

THE ATMOSPHERE IS VERY UNSTABLE ACROSS CENTRAL OHIO...AND WILL ALLOW FOR SCATTERED THUNDERSTORMS TO RAPIDLY DEVELOP AND INTENSIFY.

ALSO ANOTHER LINE...ABOUT 20 MILES WIDE...EXTENDS FROM NEAR MOUNT VERNON TO CLEVELAND.

THESE SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS WERE MOVING TO THE NORTHEAST AT 35 MILES AN HOUR.

THE STRONGEST THUNDERSTORMS IN CENTRAL OHIO WERE LOCATED IN CENTRAL

PICKAWAY AND NORTH CENTRAL FAIRFIELD COUNTIES AND WILL AFFECT THE TOWNS OF ASHVILLE...BALTIMORE...THURSTON...AND MILLERSPORT THROUGH 5 PM EDT. NO SEVERE WEATHER HAS BEEN REPORTED IN CENTRAL OHIO AS OF 415 PM EDT BUT SOME OF THE STORMS HAVE A HISTORY OF PRODUCING BRIEF HEAVY RAINS.

THE NORTHEAST-SOUTHWEST ORIENTATION OF THE LINE IS ALIGNED ALONG THE AXIS OF STORM MOVEMENT. AS A RESULT HEAVY RAIN IS POSSIBLE IN SOUTHWEST LICKING...NORTHWEST FAIRFIELD...AND NORTHEAST PICKAWAY COUNTIES.

RESIDENTS NEAR THE COMMUNITIES OF ASHVILLE...CANAL WINCHESTER...PICKERINGTON...GRANVILLE...AND NEWARK SHOULD BE ON THE LOOKOUT FOR ANY LOCALIZED STREET OR SMALL STREAM FLOODING.

IN CENTRAL OHIO

...FRANKLIN COUNTY

AT 550 PM EDT NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR IN COLUMBUS INDICATED A CLUSTER OF POSSIBLE SEVERE THUNDERSTORMS IN SOUTHERN FRANKLIN COUNTY MOVING NORTHWARD INTO THE COLUMBUS METROPOLITAN AREA. THE STORMS WERE MOVING TO THE NORTHEAST AT 30 MILES AN HOUR.

AT 543 PM EDT SPOTTERS REPORTED WIND GUSTS TO 40 MILES AN HOUR AND ONE-HALF INCH DIAMETER HAIL IN SOUTHWEST FRANKLIN COUNTY. COMMUNITIES THAT WILL BE AFFECTED ARE GROVE CITY...OBETZ...GROVEPORT...AND THE COLUMBUS METROPOLITAN AREA.

AT 630 PM EDT NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR IN COLUMBUS INDICATED THAT SEVERE THUNDERSTORMS ARE MOVING NORTHEAST AT 30 MILES AN HOUR THROUGH THE EASTERN HALF OF COLUMBUS AND FRANKLIN COUNTY. HEAVY DOWNPOURS OF RAIN HAVE BEEN REPORTED THROUGHOUT THE SOUTHEAST HALF OF FRANKLIN COUNTY.

ALSO...HEAVY RAIN CONTINUES IN NORTHERN FAIRFIELD AND SOUTHERN LICKING COUNTIES AT THIS TIME. RESIDENTS IN THOSE AREAS SHOULD CONTINUE TO BE ON THE LOOKOUT FOR LOCALIZED STREET AND SMALL STREAM FLOODING.

AT 705 PM NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR INDICATED AN AREA OF SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS WITH VERY HEAVY RAIN OVER LICKING...FAIRFIELD...AND THE NORTHERN HALF OF PERRY COUNTIES. SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS WERE REPEATEDLY TRACKING OVER CENTRAL AND NORTHERN FAIRFIELD COUNTY...CENTRAL AND SOUTHERN LICKING COUNTY...AND THE NORTHERN HALF OF PERRY COUNTY.

RADAR COMPOSITES INDICATE THAT FROM 2 TO 3 INCHES OF RAINFALL HAVE OCCURRED IN THESE AREAS SINCE 5 PM. STREET FLOODING HAS BEEN REPORTED IN HEATH AND PATASKALA IN LICKING COUNTY.

THE SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS WITH VERY HEAVY RAINFALL WILL CONTINUE IN THESE AREAS THROUGH THIS EVENING...AND CAUSE STREET FLOODING IN TOWNS. FLOODING WILL ALSO OCCUR IN LOW LYING AREAS...AND POSSIBLY NEAR SOME OF THE SMALL STREAMS.

AMOUNTS RANGED FROM LESS THAN 1 INCH SOUTH OF A ZANESVILLE TO LANCASTER TO CIRCLEVILLE LINE...UP TO 5 INCHES IN THE AREA AROUND BUCKEYE LAKE IN SOUTHERN LICKING...NORTHWEST PERRY...AND NORTHEAST FAIRFIELD COUNTIES. 1 TO 2 INCH AMOUNTS OCCURRED IN DELAWARE...NORTHWEST FRANKLIN...AND MADISON COUNTIES.

THE RAIN MOVED OUT OF CENTRAL OHIO EARLY THIS MORNING. HOWEVER... NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE RADAR AT 1025 AM INDICATED WIDELY SCATTERED SHOWERS REDEVELOPING BETWEEN COLUMBUS AND CHILLICOTHE...AND JUST NORTH OF MARION. MORE SHOWERS WERE MOVING INTO WESTERN OHIO. THE SHOWERS WERE MOVING EAST-NORTHEAST AT 35 MILES AN HOUR.

MORE SHOWERS AND THUNDERSTORMS ARE EXPECTED TO MOVE INTO CENTRAL OHIO THIS AFTERNOON...WITH THE POTENTIAL TO PRODUCE HEAVY RAINFALL. THE MAIN THREAT FOR FLOODING WILL BE FROM SMALL STREAMS AND STREET FLOODING IN TOWNS AND CITIES.
