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out of the way at the scenes by city work crews and will be picked up Sunday or Monday, Dietz said.

• At least 75 trees blocked county roads and were removed by the county engineer department. Hundreds of reports were received on limbs across roads.

• Telephone service in Johnstown, Galena and Sunbury was disrupted. Hundreds of subscribers were reported without service.

• Opossum Run Rd. near Darbydale was dangerous because of fallen utility poles and wires.

• Bixby Rd. between Hamilton and Ebright Rds. and Williams Rd. between Alum Creek and Spangler Rd. were covered by water and impassable until late Saturday afternoon.

• Several tree surgeon firms reported they were swamped by calls of property owners who wanted damaged trees or tree limbs removed.

• Twenty-two hundred power failures were reported to the Columbus & Southern Ohio Electric Co., mostly due to utility lines being struck by falling tree limbs.

Primary lines serving large areas were repaired by Saturday afternoon, but not until Sunday will the utility be able to restore all service where lines into homes were broken.

MEANWHILE, THE Scioto River was reported to be rising in some areas south of Columbus due to the heavy rainfall and ice storm.

At Circleville, where the flood stage is 14 feet, the crest is expected at 13-14 feet Sunday. At Chillicothe, with a flood stage of 16 feet, the river is expected to crest around 15 feet Sunday night.

In Piketon (Pike County) a

crest of 20-21 feet is expected Sunday morning. The river

passed the flood stage of 16

feet Saturday afternoon.

IN MOST instances, the lowland areas adjoining the river are flooded when the river goes out of its banks.

The Ohio Highway Patrol

reported road conditions good

in the Columbus area and to

the south. But, north of Dela-

ware the roads were danger-

ous with snow and slush, the

patrol said.

A close estimate of the ac-

tual damage to trees may

never be obtained.

THE COST OF a new plant-
ing for a tree three to four
inches in diameter is \$75 to
\$80. Trees up to 18 inches
in diameter cost \$20 an inch.

Ohio State University ex-
perts said the cost could be
determined only after count-
ing every damaged tree.

The Ohio Central Tele-
phone Co., which serves the

Johnstown, Sunbury and Galena areas, said hundreds of their subscribers were without service Saturday night.

SEVERAL HUNDRED telephone poles were toppled by ice. Main feeder lines were broken, including that to Columbus, which was replaced by a temporary line.

About 500 of 1500 customers in the Johnstown exchange were without phone service. Seventy-five per cent of rural customers also were without service.

Between 30 to 50 poles of the Galena exchange in Harlem Rd. in southeastern Delaware County were down.

CROTON WAS isolated, but service there was to be restored by noon Sunday.

The company estimated three or four days would be required to place all phones back in service.

DiSalle Urges: 'Take It Easy'

Gov. Michael V. DiSalle urged Ohioans Saturday not to be "too demanding" of astronaut John H. Glenn Jr. for personal appearances.

"We may be torturing our heroes to the point where they may lose their initiative," the governor said.

LATER IN THE day he verified a query that he joined the Ohio Exposition Commission (appointed by him) in extending an invitation to Glenn to appear in Columbus at a state dinner. The governor explained:

"The commission members and I agreed on the dates (either March 12 or 14) before the flight, and an invitation was extended minutes after it was completed."
